GHADS VS. CFDS

At times, the use of Geologic Hazard Abatement Districts (GHADs) is evaluated against other long-term funding alternatives, such as Community Facilities Districts (CFDs). While the termination of CFDs is often tied to repayment of infrastructure bonds, GHADs are usually created with perpetual funding streams and corresponding long-term operations, maintenance and prevention responsibilities. Below is a brief comparison of several of the key aspects of GHADs and CFDs.
